



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FARM CLUB VISIT ...






......Hartpury College, animal collection.





BITS & PIECES

'BARTON STREET GARDENING GROUP - CALL FOR PARTICIPANTS.



Since March 2022, a small group of local residents has been supported by Gloucester Wildlife Trust and Fair Shares to revitalise and maintain the planters along Barton Street. GWT also installed 3 more large planters and commissioned a mural! The idea is to brighten up the street for those who live and work here as well as to provide flowers for pollinating insects and also to develop a sense of shared purpose for the people who are involved.

So far we've had a season of wild flowers followed by shrubs and perennial plants paid for by a grant from Gloucester Rotary Clubs. The shrubs and perennials were planted in response to feedback from local people that they wanted more year-round colour than the wildflowers could give.

The group is informal, we arrange to meet when there is some work to do. We usually meet for an hour or two on a Wednesday morning. People are very welcome to come along and do as much or as little as they want and are able. The morning usually involves refreshments and a good chat.

We plant, water, weed and prune. We also litter pick around the planters. We've had some lovely positive feedback from passers by who have said that it cheers the area up and shows that people do care about the environment in Barton.
